The Urgent Care Clinic (UCC) in Moe provides GP-led care for non-life-threatening conditions, without the need for you to visit an emergency department.

The Latrobe UCC provides immediate high-quality care for patients with non-life threatening injuries or illnesses. The UCC is supported by a highly skilled team of independent doctors and nurses.

When should I visit the UCC?

Some common illnesses or injuries that you can receive priority care for include:

- mild to moderate infections
- fever
- pain when urinating
- suspected minor fractures and sprains
- back and muscle pain
- minor cuts, burns, and insect or animal bites
- heartburn, vomiting, nausea
- headaches, migraines and brief fainting
- constipation, diarrhoea, abdominal pain
- allergies and rashes
- light bleeding in the first trimester of pregnancy
- mild to moderate asthma attacks, coughs and other respiratory symptoms.

You should continue to see your normal GP for non-urgent care, including the provision of sick leave certificates, prescription renewals and regular health checks.

When should I call Triple Zero (000)?

Call Triple Zero (000) or visit your nearest emergency department if you are experiencing the following:

- Chest pain or tightness
- Breathing difficulties
- Uncontrollable bleeding
- Severe burns
- Poisoning
- Unconsciousness or seizures
- Numbness or paralysis
- A life-threatening injury
- On going fever in infants
- Unresponsive

When is the Latrobe UCC open?

The Latrobe UCC is open 7 days a week from 8am to 10pm.

Do I need to make an appointment?

The Latrobe UCC accepts walk-ups and referrals, and runs as a triage service, meaning people with the most urgent medical needs are seen first.

This service ensure vital Emergency Department resources are freed up for patients with more critical needs.

You can just walk straight into the centre, or your GP may refer you.

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
